


Jesus often told twin parables. These parables should be considered as “fraternal twins,” not “identical twins.” They teach on the same topic, but emphasize something different within that topic.

Looking at the differences of these twin parables, how would you summarize the meaning of this parable?

READ MATTHEW 13:47-48

This parable focuses on the end of this age and the beginning of the fully anticipated Kingdom. Notice how the parable compares the Kingdom to a net. Only when the net was full did the end come. What do you think a full net means?

Often times our ideas of angels are misguided.

In what ways do modern ideas of angels differ from a Biblical description of angels?



What are the angels seen doing in these twin parables? Why is this information included in the parable?

On judgment day no human can overcome the power of an angel, nor will any person be able to hide from an angel come to bring judgment on the earth.



The power of angels is meant to be a fearful thing for unbelievers, but how should believers feel about an angel's power? (see 2 Kings 6:17-20, Heb. 1:14, Rev. 7:1-3)

Leviticus 11:9-12

“These you may eat, of all that are in the waters. Everything in the waters that has fins and scales, whether in the seas or in the rivers, you may eat. But anything in the seas or the rivers that does not have fins and scales, of the swarming creatures in the waters and of the living creatures that are in the waters, is detestable to you. You shall regard them as detestable; you shall not eat any of their flesh, and you shall detest their carcasses. Everything in the waters that does not have fins and scales is **detestable to you**.



In the parable (Matthew 13:48) why would fishermen separate the fish that had been caught in the net?



Are there any foods you consider detestable?

This parable is teaching us that God views sin in a similar way that we view “unclean” food. Just as we won’t allow it to enter into our body, God will not allow sin to enter into His Kingdom.

Revelation 21:27

*But nothing unclean will ever enter it, nor anyone who does **what is detestable** or false, but only those who are written in the Lamb’s book of life.*



Unclean

The previous parable focuses on what happens to the weeds and the wheat. This parable only tells us what happens to the bad fish. It is a parable of warning.

Describe the good fish



Describe the bad fish



The world describes good and bad based on our actions: Do our good actions outweigh our bad actions? Are our actions hurting anyone else? Do our actions have good intentions? Are our actions based on “love?” This is vastly different from how Jesus describes good in Mark 10:18 and how David describes sin in Psalm 51:4



Does your description of the good and bad fish align more with how the world views good and bad or how God views good and bad?

“Sinning is any feeling or thought or speech or action that comes from a heart that does not treasure God over all other things.”

John Piper



If all have sinned, if all fail to treasure God over all other things, if no one is good, then how can we ever be counted as the good fish in the parable? (See Revelation 22:14)

Revelation 22:12-13

“Behold, I am coming soon, bringing my recompense with me, to repay each one for what he has done. I am the Alpha and the Omega, the first and the last, the beginning and the end.”



Does this verse scare you or excite you? Why? What is promised for the bad fish? Are you prepared for the return of Christ? Are you concerned that others might not be prepared?
